IMAGINING MIXED-USE NEIGHBOURHOODS

Creative Design Entries Needed To Change Single-Family Zoning

The Urbanarium has issued an invitation to designers around the world to develop and present innovative solutions that enhance community vitality. Existing monocultural single-family neighbourhoods need to densify with Missing Middle housing, but that on its own isn't enough. Those neighborhoods also need a variety of activities to thrive. This competition asks designers to add new mixed-use functionality to skillfully enhance densifying areas, building on lessons learned during the pandemic.

Welcome to The Mixing Middle.

In order to achieve our goal of an open design ideas competition in an effort at fostering Metro Vancouver community-based solutions and social innovation **WE ARE SEEKING SPONSORS.** This is a rare opportunity for young architects, planners, designers and residents to solve issues at the local level while participating in what will be an international competition.

In cities and neighbourhoods, many people experienced the COVID-19 pandemic with a deeper attachment to and attention paid to their residential neighbourhoods, whether working from home, providing more care for others, or self-isolating due to exposures. These experiences have stimulated latent creativity in terms of live-work design and intergenerational living. The Mixing Middle competition is intended to explore some of these new possibilities, as well as other old ideas that enhance community vitality. The generation of ideas through the competition is intended to show the public what may be possible and to stimulate informed discussion.

The Urbanarium's 2018 design competition, The Missing Middle spurred new thinking about how to develop transitional residential densification in single-family zones and build shared resiliency in a 5-minute walkable city. This competition takes the next step and asks designers to add new mixed-use functionality to enhance densifying areas.

Technological innovation in terms of video conferencing as well as in making, food distribution, sales and marketing, have gone hand in hand, to facilitate what has been for many a successful change of lifestyle. Sociological changes in North America have also transformed many urban regions into diverse "Arrival Cities," embedding new cultural practices and needs into what remain to be rigid single-family zoned neighbourhoods.

The challenge is for the proponents to conceive of imaginative new relationships between the myriad of unplanned alternative uses that have cropped up in single family zones of cities and municipalities, mixing uses within close proximity to one another. The question will be whether this mixing will lead to a lifestyle that is more viable in the working world and can be made more satisfying, walkable, sociable, culturally inclusive, healthy and sustainable.

The Mixing Middle Competition sites have been chosen in **VANCOUVER**, **COQUITLAM**, **SURREY AND NORTH VANCOUVER** all in single-family residential use zones.

The Jury will name the Overall Prize winners (\$10,000 First place, \$5,000 Second, \$3,000 Third and 5 Honourable Mentions at \$1,500), as well as the Planners Prize (\$10,000) on advice from the Planners' Advisory Group. Registration closes November 2nd, 2021 with the deadline for submissions in January 14th, 2022. We have tentatively scheduled February 11th for the Awards Ceremony.

The Missing Middle Competition

In 2018 Urbanarium held an international design competition to develop and present exciting options for addressing Metro Vancouver's unprecedented housing affordability crisis and social health challenges with outstanding design and social innovation. There were four study areas, one each in Vancouver, Port Coquitlam, Burnaby and Surrey.

The Jury

Applicants were assigned one of the study areas randomly. Each study area was around four blocks in size and competitors selected one or two single-family lots to design and provide some contextual assessment based on the study area and municipal plans and by-laws.

Micro Op: FIRST & PLANNERS PRIZE by HAECCITY STUDIO ARCHITECTURE

Big part of Haccity's submission was the larger conversation of co-op's and sharing models, the economics of tenure and ideas and importance around friendships. Micro Op proposed a zoning amendment for the 'buffer zones' - the first three blocks flanking arterials - between mixed use / commercial zones and single family neighbourhoods. Signaling the residential renewal that will help affordably house future generations, zone "R-5R" would specifically address the land value speculation that has arisen along withdensification. In order to ease the transition of R5 zones,guidelines would cultivate a new typology that can both co-exist with detached homes, and form a cohesive community after propagation.

The Winners



Urbanarium concluded the competition by announcing the winners during an awards ceremony held at Surrey City Hall on March 7, 2018.



The \$10,000 Grand Prize went to Haeccity Studio Architecture of Vancouver. The Happy Middle team took the \$5,000 second prize, and two submissions tied for the \$1,500 third prize (Goodale Architects and Planners of Pasadena, California and Alt Forma of Vancouver).



The Missing Middle Competition Publication

The Missing Middle publication publication contains both the insight and policy recommendations gathered from the various competition entries for adding innovative density to existing single family zones. Included are the winning projects located in one of four sites in Vancouver, Port Coquitlam, Burnaby and Surrey. Results from this competition inform our Policy Impact Proposal, suggesting five small shifts in current zoning policy that can contribute to housing affordability and vibrancy in communities, while maintaining existing character. Winning projects can be referenced by location, as well as finance and tenure type, using the Project Index.

The publication was released in February 2020 and has be distributed to participants, planners, civic leaders and developers in various municipalities. Hard copies are available for sale at VAncouver Special on Main Street. A digital version is available in PDF format on our website.
