



CONTEXT

what is the relevance of public washrooms?

- everyone needs to go
- we are not in complete control of our bodies
- public washrooms register psychological and sociological uncertainties about our bodies and surroundings








Public washrooms should be considered within a greater scope of urban design and policy.

CONTEXT

how do public washrooms affect us?

- scale of impact affects beyond just the building
- embodies larger issues of exclusion based on class, race, gender
- access to public washrooms should be a basic human right



CONTEXT

how do we use washrooms?




CONTEXT

- a tool that allows people to stay longer and go farther






history of public washrooms


- public washrooms were implemented to prevent bodily elimination in the streets and the control disease and outbreak






PUBLIC CONVENIENCE

history of public washrooms in Metro Vancouver

Constructed from plans designed in England, Vancouver's first batch of public toilets were not durable and required to be replaced after ten years. These architectural drawings, commissioned for the City of Vancouver in 1908, illustrate an elaborate public convenience design to be placed as a prototypical facility in the city.





Constructed Hamilton Street underground convenience at Victory Square




UNDERGROUND CONVENIENCE

history of public washrooms in Metro Vancouver


Located underground, the Hamilton street underground convenience is removed from the bustling public streets. As part Vancouver's city provision to clean the urban context, the conveniences rid the streets of poor toilet behaviour and unsightly habits.


With limited operating hours from 6 am to 6 pm, they reportedly cost \$100,000 each year, and are not accessible to people with disabilities as it is located underground through stair access.



SANITARY CONVENIENCE

history of public washrooms in Metro Vancouver

With growing urban sprawl, public work projects began to focus on developing peripheral parks rather than upgrading washroom facilities in urban centers. Numerous sanitary conveniences were proposed in outlying parks and along highways featuring attractive architecture and floral landscaping. These conveniences often combined washroom facilities with concession stands.





PRESENT

impact from COVID-19

- pandemic has exacerbated existing inequalities and vulnerabilities due to lack of access to public washrooms in Metro Vancouver, especially DTES
- April 24, 2020, a newborn was found dead in a portable toilet
- portable toilets, meant to be a temporary solution, has created
 new health and safety problems
- a greater need for public washrooms is critical now more than ever

Victoria Public Urinal

To address public urination in Victoria's downtown, this public art piece was created. Undulating metal tubes conceal one urinal with open air access.




Vancouver's Automated Public Toilet (APT)

Manufactured by JCDecaux, these automated toilets self clean after each use. The average cost per unit is \$82,500. These facilities are often broken down due to its complex mechanisms.



PRECEDENTS

innovative projects around the world

The Xingshe Public Toilets push the boundaries on typical public toilet design, integrating a resting oasis for outdoor staff, community service center, and public activity place into a unique typology. The new facilities consist of ten completed projects with three standard layouts and four different elevation patterns, becoming an integral part of the "toilet reformation" in China's urban centers. Each facility includes WIFI, digital toilet management and mobile charging stations with a multifunctional space on second floor allows community to participate in activities.

A circular toilet block design, wrapped in vertical metal louvres, creates privacy while letting air circulate.





Two public toilets are surrounded with transparent glass walls that become opaque when they are occupied.

The Tokyo Toilet project includes several unique public washroom designs by Japan's most notable architects. With many design constructed and numerous underway, the city has commissioned site specific washrooms to be located at critical points within the city as vital component of its urban fabric. Promoting hospitality through safe and clean access to public washrooms help activate communities and enrich our lives.

City of Vancouver 2021 Budget and Five-Year Financial Plan

 begin implementation of the Washroom Strategy to provide single-user washrooms with universal options for all users, to ensure that a safe, clean and accessible washroom is available to everyone

VanPlay Report

- 2040 Asset Targets: a washroom facility near every destination playground, sports field, water recreation access point and community gardens, and at intervals along the Primary Network.
- Achieve 70-80% of washrooms in good condition or better
